Woe is me...Blessed is me...Send Me Isaiah 6:5, 7, 8

WOE IS ME

A man named Isaiah "had" to "live" on mission for His King. It "burned" within him. He could not sit

still. I'm wondering what causes a man to be "on fire" for His King so much that he "has" to go on mission for Him? He cries out in verse 8, "Here I am! Send me!" What could cause a church like ours to be compelled to "live" on mission with a burning passion like Isaiah had?

For Isaiah, the first thing that started the fire within was a look above. He saw King Jesus "high and lifted" up. He saw His majesty. He saw His might. He saw His awesomeness. So holy is Jesus the seraphim had to declare it three times: "Holy, holy, holy..." When Isaiah saw this, I imagine all he could say was, "Wonderful is HE and woe is me."

We don't see our sin until we see our Savior. We are blind to it. But when we see our Savior-King, everything becomes real. A true look above will reveal a true look within. That's the second thing that compelled Isaiah to live on mission and say, "Send me". But first, he said, "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips, for my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

BLESSED IS ME

You and I just need one true glimpse of Jesus and everything will change. Even the guilt that lies within us will change. Jesus didn't point the finger at Isaiah and call him a filthy sinner. He had a seraphim touch his lips with a burning coal and said, "Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for."

Do you see? Isaiah should have received a "guilty" sentence. We should get the guilty sentence - but Christ took the "woe is me" and turned it into a "blessed is me"!

SEND ME

Saint Mark's, do we realize our "blessing" from the King of Kings? Until we see our sin for what it is like Isaiah did (woe is me), we will not see our Savior for who He is and what He has done (blessed is me). When we realize the impact He has on our heart, soul, mind, and strength, we will then "burn" with the passion and say in response, "Here I am. Send me!" Send me. Send me.

We have a team from Saint Mark's who have said, "Send me". A team of missionaries are joining Madison United Methodist for a trip to Honduras in June. Read about it under the mission section of the Beacon!

An Encouraging Word From Jo Hebert

I missed the deadline for the Beacon last month. In a sea of kids' activities, appointments, and the usual day-to-day tasks, I found myself struggling to tread water a few times last month. My prayers vacillated between, "Thank you God that you hold everything including me—together," to "I can't keep up, Lord." I had to drop any ideals of perfection (it would do me well to drop them forever), and reckon with the fact that a few things (like the Beacon) had slipped out of my grasp.

When our perception tells us that the demands are higher than our supply, we can feel stressed, depleted, defeated, frustrated... anxious. Anxiety can take many forms and levels of intensity. Because it is so prevalent and such a joy-stealer, I'd like to use this and next month's articles to share some practical tips for dealing with anxiety.

I'm going to start with addressing a severe level of anxiety: Panic attacks. If this section doesn't apply to you, be thankful. And, keep reading, because you might be able to help someone you know. A full-fledged panic attack can be very terrifying and even debilitating for a time. But, knowing what is going on physiologically and knowing how to "ride out" the attacks can limit their severity and frequency. In a panic attack, your body goes into a "fight or flight" response. An errant message is sent to your brain telling you that you need to prepare for an emergency, which would require exorbitant amounts of energy. There may or may not be an identifiable trigger, and it can even happen while asleep. Symptoms of a panic attack can include: accelerated heart rate, sweating, trembling, shortness of breath, chest pain, nausea, and dizziness, accompanied by an intense fear or discomfort. Also present is usually the fear of dying or the fear of losing control/"going crazy."

If this sounds familiar to you, take heart. You are not dying or going crazy. Your body is doing something it was designed to do...but out of context. You can learn to recognize the signs quickly and take action. Oddly, the action needed is to resist the urge to fight it and, instead, float through it-reminding yourself that this is only a panic attack and you will feel ok soon. Then, finding a somewhat mindless, repetitive activity is your next step. This can be playing an instrument, playing solitaire, folding clothes, washing dishes, etc. Something to do with your hands is ideal, though watching TV can also be helpful. Many people discover that once they implement these methods, the panic attacks

lesson dramatically. (I have other techniques and handouts I could share with you if you need more tips on what to do during a panic attack).

Once your anxiety level has reached a more rational level, you can begin to combat it with TRUTH. Keep Philippians 4:9 close by: "Whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue, and if there is anything praiseworthy, meditate on these things." What is true and good in your life? Ask God to call those things to mind and to help you "hold captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ" (2 Corinthians 10:5). Remind yourself of how He has helped you overcome troubles in the past, and that "God always leads us in triumph in Christ" (2 Corinthians 2:14). Another triumph is coming. Watch for it.
