An Encouraging Word From Jo Hebert

In Hebert

When this Beacon is delivered, spring will most likely be in full bloom, but as I write this, temperatures are expected to drop all day to a low of 30 (and it was in the 70s yesterday!). Even though these fluctuations are not surprising this time of year, no one likes them...we are eager for warmer temperatures, flip-flops, and baseball. The daffodils, Bradford pears, (and yes, the weeds) are ahead of the game, while the red maple in my back yard barely shows a hint of buds appearing. Other trees show no signs at all that they will give life again...but they will.

All of creation tells us the story of death and resurrection, and the hope of the gospel. The bleakness of winter causes us to long for spring. Since we have grown accustomed to the changes of the seasons, we always know that, even on the most bitterly cold days, it will get warm again. We just have to wait for it.

This demonstration of death and resurrection can be seen in all facets of life: an injury slowly healing, a filthy person becoming clean again, getting to the end of yourself and then finding a renewed strength, cutting words followed by "I'm sorry." And, I believe one very powerful place the gospel is displayed is in the marriage relationship.

A deeply fulfilling marriage is nourished and enriched by periods of change and challenge. Sadly, not every marriage survives, but couples who hold on through the winters, looking to the Lord for endurance and guidance, will see their marriages bring forth some breath-taking blooms when spring comes. Unlike the earth's seasons, the seasons of marriage are not predictable...we don't know for sure how long the winter will last or even if our spouse will produce the fruit we are desperately hoping for. That's why we have to go to Jesus.

In The Meaning of Marriage, Timothy Keller speaks of the power of the gospel in marriage: "The gospel can fill our hearts with God's love so that you can handle it when your spouse fails to love you as he or she should. That frees us to see our spouse's sins and flaws to the bottom—and speak of them—and yet still love and accept our spouse fully." He isn't talking about over-looking sin, but depending on the love of God to enable us to love when we don't feel loved. Keller also says, "The reason that marriage is so painful and yet wonderful is because it is a reflection of the gospel, which is painful and wonderful at once. The gospel is this: we are more sinful and flawed in ourselves than we ever dared believe, yet at the very same time we are more loved and accepted in Jesus Christ than we ever dared hope."

If you are married, I encourage you to look really closely for the buds on the branches. Nurture them through kind words, apologies, and forgiveness. Water the flowers and not the weeds. Spring is coming. If you're not married, you still get to experience new life in Christ through all the seasons of your life, as you fall and get back up, become empty and full again.

Our Savior died and rose again to give us new life in Him. The whole earth tells His story. Happy Easter!!






