An Encouraging Word From Jo Hebert

Have you heard of CBT? It's almost a buzz word right now...even John Tesh is talking about it on the radio. But, it is not new. Cognitive Behavioral Therapy grew out of work by Albert Ellis and Aaron Beck in the 1950's and 1960's and is widely used today for the treatment of all kinds of problems, including depression, anxiety, and addiction. The central focus of CBT is recognizing and changing irrational thoughts. Many of the principles of CBT are compatible with, and I believe strengthened by, scripture.

One of my favorite parts of counseling is accompanying someone as they learn that they can think differently. A workaholic husband uncovers and shoots down the beliefs driving the need to prove himself to his family...and begins to see, little by little, the truth that he is accepted and loved apart from his success. Freedom draws nearer. A victim of childhood sexual abuse begins to realize maybe she is not defective to the core, as she has always thought... and that she can catch herself in the act of berating herself and choose another way. Chains fall off. Grace (a foreign notion for so many) is ushered in.

I'm going deep now. Harry Potter deep. If you have read the series, or watched the movies, you know that the dementors are ghostly, cloaked figures that literally suck the life out of their victims. When they show up, warmth and light are snuffed out, and those nearby feel as though they will never be cheerful again. Harry learns that, in order to make the dementors flee, he must cast a patronus charm by focusing his energy on a powerfully happy memory that stirs up hope and the desire to survive. Likewise, Harry is taught in book 6 by Snape to "discipline his mind" so that the Dark Lord cannot penetrate his thoughts. (He doesn't do as well with that...)

I LOVE those concepts because, to me, they scream biblical significance (whether the author intended it or not). Romans 12:2 says, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." And, we are taught in 2 Corinthians 10:5 to "cast down arguments and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ." And my favorite (yes, I keep coming back to this one...), Phil 4:8: "whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and

if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things."

This discipline of allowing God to renew our minds continually is a life-long endeavor of letting Him show us what's not true and good in our lives, and then teach us what is true. Sometimes it's an excruciating process similar to Eustace changing from a dragon back to a boy in Voyage of the Dawn Treader (no time to talk about C.S. Lewis right now), but the chains falling off make a glorious sound that chases off any dementor.

"And he fixed his attention on them, expecting to receive something from them."

~ Acts 3:5

Day after day, week after week, life can get normal. We seemed to fall into a rut of knowing what to "expect".

A lame man from birth in Acts 3 came to know what to "expect" every day. He did not imagine anything new. He was stuck. Ever been there? He was not expecting or asking anything

from the God of the bible...not healing, nothing beautiful...no life saving gospel. Nothing new for 40 plus years!

Is that you? Same 'ole same 'ole? He could not take a single step in his lame life. What he did not realize was this: an "unexpected" step was about to happen for him. You see, he sat right outside the temple gate called, "The Beautiful Gate". He was on the verge of something beautiful. We're not only on the verge of something beautiful, the beautiful is already in us: Jesus Christ!

This lame man is the picture of each of us. He did not expect or ask for Jesus. But Peter and John gave him Jesus Christ of Nazareth! Sounds familiar to the gospel, doesn't it? Did we expect or ask the Father to send His Son? Nope. What did the Father do? He gave us Jesus. More than we could expect. More than we could ever deserve.

That's why this guy is a picture of us: he expected alms. He got the Almighty! Nothing was "normal" from that point on for this guy. He had never walked or leaped before. Jesus had given him a "new normal"!

How about us? Could this be a season of "new normals"? I'm wondering what the "next step" in your life is? Maybe it is something that you never expected! Don't simply think health, wealth, and prosperity here. Think Kingdom advancement...disciples made... marriages saved, people healed & baptized, souls redeemed; prayers revived; Scriptural holiness being lived out; the church actually being salt and light; Jesus being boldly and unashamedly proclaimed.

Listen, dead people stay dead. Lame people stay lame. They don't rise and walk. At least, that is what we have come to expect. Jesus Christ is the God of the "unexpected". I don't know what is "lame" in your life, but let me make a bold prediction: I believe that you are going to experience something beautiful and unexpected in the months to come...something only explainable by the Resurrection power of Christ. Not a change in your circumstances necessarily, but a change in your heart and mind, at the least.

Jesus predicted He would rise from the dead. He rose. Isaiah predicted that the "lame man" would leap like a deer" in Isaiah 35:6. He leaped in Acts 3. I'm not Jesus and I'm not Scripture, but I predict that you and our faith family at Saint Marks's are going to experience a "new normal" in the Resurrection power of our Lord in these months of Resurrection…not for our sakes, but for the sake of gospel mission. At least, that's what I expect. How about you?
