Many who are young and able to run a marathon or climb a ladder to change a light bulb, or drive to a movie with friends. While there are others who are older now and although they did these things in the prime of life, they are unable to do so now. We can hook you up with some great people and you will be a blessing to each other.

An Encouraging Word From Jo Hebert

I recently started eating sunflower seeds. I've always loved shelled ones on my salad, but after watching my softball-playing daughter acquire the habit of eating the ones in the shell, I wanted to try them. When I put the first one in my mouth, I thought, "how in the world is this done??" I asked May how she learned to put so many in her mouth at once and still distinguish shell from seed. Was this something she was taught? Had she seen a tutorial on eating sunflower seeds? What made her (and clearly millions of other people) willing to work so hard for those kernels? The fascination began (yes, I am easily amused and might have the tendency to overthink things a bit).

After five or so attempts in the last month, May tells me I am still not allowed to eat them around her until I get the spit part down, but I have improved! Most of my shells are nicely split in half, I swallow less shell parts, and spit out far less seeds. I'm actually seeing the fun of it. Who knew? (everyone.)

I never saw a tutorial. I had no similar prior experience from which to draw knowledge. Though I did ask May for instructions, they didn't help. I had to just do it and figure it out.

Over and over in our lives, we are faced with new experiences. Unlike my new venture, which I chose and has no consequence whatsoever in my life, some challenges require our full attention and have a lot hinging on our handling of them. In Joshua 3:4, Joshua's men told the Israelites, who were about to cross the Jordan, "Then you will know which way to go, since you have never been this way before." Their successful crossing required keen attention to instruction.

Our desire for instruction can lead us to read lots of books. Ask a new mom or someone facing a marital problem. We want someone to tell us what to do and when it will get better. Books aren't bad (I recommend lots of them), but there is no substitute for the presence of the Lord on a new path. When we seek Him and His truth with all of our hearts, He can teach us through our time with Him in prayer and scripture how to maneuver our way through the unknown. "He will guide you continually, and satisfy your soul in drought" (Isaiah 58:11).

If you are in a new spot, first be kind to yourself. You haven't been this way before. You don't have to know what to do. But, remember you have accomplished other impossible feats with the Lord's help. Draw upon His strength that is made perfect in your weakness. You will know what to do as you move forward trusting Him. You can become a studier and an expert of your own spouse, your own child, or your own challenge. And as you go, you will gain confidence—"confidence in God through Christ. Not that we are adequate in ourselves to consider anything as if it were coming from ourselves, but our adequacy is from God" (2 Cor. 3:5).

Anything new requires practice. We might swallow some shells while we are learning. But, keep trying and trusting, and you will find kernels of truth that satisfy more than you expected.

"*For freedom Christ has set us free...*" - Galatians 5:1

Nothing can stop a Christian who realizes his or her freedom in Jesus. Nothing and no one can steal your freedom (Galatians 2:4-5).

In the month of July, we celebrate our country winning her freedom. I want us to celebrate the freedom we have in Jesus even more. It's not

something you will gain one day in the future. You are already free. "For freedom Christ has set us free...". Notice the "past tense". You have been rescued! You're position before the Father is won. Live out practically who you are positionally! Don't cage yourself in behind guilt, sin, or the approval of others any longer. Jesus took your place in the "cage". Jump out. Live.

A pastor tells the story of vacationing in the Galapagos Islands. Google it. It's amazing. Sea lions literally lay down on the beach with you. He was in the habitat of all sorts of animals living "uncaged" before his very eyes. He was face to face with a mammoth marine iguana; he walked the beach with hundreds of barking sea lions, floated above manta rays as they swam along the ocean floor, and saw pelicans circle in the air before dive-bombing full speed into the ocean, coming up with breakfast!

He returned home with his family and they took a trip to the zoo. He noticed something. In comparison to the Galapagos Islands, the zoo was too safe. Too predictable. 400 pound gorillas were behind protective plexiglas windows and birds were locked in cages. He had this thought: "I wonder if churches do to people what zoos do to animals."

I wonder what protective plexiglas we might be putting ourselves behind and don't even know it? We were not saved to protect ourselves but to promote Christ (Ephesians 2:8-10). Are you trapped behind something? Maybe the cage you have been living in has become comfortable and safe. It's all you've ever known. Take a risk. Jump "out" because you are "in" Christ! You are free in Him.



Stars of Completeness





Fifty states and fifty stars – gives some folks a sense of completeness. But when the Declaration of Independence was signed 238 years ago, its words described a beginning and not an end. It was, in a sense, a declaration of *incompleteness*. Thomas Jefferson wrote, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

The pursuit of happiness... seems like that one is never complete. But maybe we could work toward a little more perfection by adding some more "stars" to the Star Spangled Banner. Perhaps the first could be equality: we are *created* equal. Being created requires a divine Creator. Psalm 8 sings about us being made "a little lower than God" and "crowned with glory and honor." That is who we are according to Scripture. Because we are created in the image of God, we have the capacity to reach out in love and compassion to accept one another as the Lord has accepted us.

As we celebrate the Fourth of July, we could think of a new star of liberty and the freedom we have as Christians. The original signers of the Declaration of Independence wanted to escape the tyranny of the king of England. The tyrant we need to escape today is something else – human sinfulness. In John 8, Jesus tells us about this need for freedom when he said, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin." It's his declaration of our incompleteness, but there is a way to wholeness. "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples," he counsels, "and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." When we follow him, we gain a whole new way of living in completeness.

Each of us needs forgiveness. Each of us needs independence from slavery to sin. The good news is that we have true liberty when we put our trust in Christ and follow him in faith.

Adding these stars of equality and freedom is sure to make a strange looking 52-star flag. But completeness and perfection will not be captured by a flag but by a relationship with the God who created us and set us free. We will always declare our incompleteness until we are one with the One Lord. This is a union that will ultimately take place beyond the stars... and the stripes.
