An Encouraging Word From Jo Hebert

This month, I'd like to share with you an update on our DivorceCare ministry at St. Mark's, including the outcome of our first class and our plans for this year. I also invite you to pray for this ministry. (If you don't yet know what DivorceCare is...it is a 13-week class for those going through separation and divorce. Participants watch videos each week on topics pertaining to divorce and take part in small group discussion led by understanding leaders who have been divorced themselves. I help coordinate the class and welcome participants each week).

After having 22 people come to the initial orientation in August, we had 16 who came to most of the 13 DivorceCare classes. These participants, some separated and some divorced, split into small groups led by Merriam Smiley, Suzanne Gural, Jim Matheny, and Katherine Heard. We were delighted to see the participants go from being very shy around one another to interacting comfortably. (In fact, on their own, they planned a New Year's party after the group came to a close...we thought that was a good sign!) Their completed evaluation forms indicated that the class had been helpful, and two signed up to take it again.

We followed up the 13 regular DivorceCare classes with a Surviving the Holidays class, which was well attended by most of the regular participants plus six new faces. We are thankful to the Lord for a better first go at this than we could have hoped. Thanks also go out to those who prayed for DivorceCare, those who prepared snacks for our participants, and church administration for investing in this ministry (childcare, signs, curriculum, etc.).

We are now in the middle of our second series of classes, with plans to offer DivorceCare twice a year. We are meeting on Thursday evenings, averaging 12 participants each week, grateful for our new small group leader named Jonathan McKinnon, who was a participant in the fall.

If you know of someone separated or divorced, please tell them about this ministry. They can register online through the website or by calling or emailing me (601-259-1749, **jhebertlpc@comcast.net**). Participants are welcome to join anytime. If you would like to help with snacks or advertising, you can contact Merriam Smiley (303-903-0769).

And, we would especially like your prayers and consideration about a component we hope to add to DivorceCare when we offer it in the fall. Kid Care is a program that is designed for children with parents going through divorce. We already have the curriculum, and we are looking for someone with a desire and willingness to take the lead in organizing the class for children and/or teens, which will run at the same time as DivorceCare. If you have a heart for kids and the time to commit to starting up a vital ministry, we'd love to talk to you.

And that's what's happening with DivorceCare. We are grateful for your prayers and support, and thankful to be part of a church that offers the hope of Christ to those who are hurting.

Many of our Sunday School classes are viewing "The Power of We". In the last session, Bishop Swanson talks about discipleship and providing "contagious communities" in our churches. Let us all strive to do just that – make our visitors want to return because they experience the "contagious" love of Christ through all of us!

Anyone can be common. *Anyone* can be like *everyone*. Only those in Christ can be a John 15 *someone*.

Jeff Nesbit Jeff Nesbit There is nothing unique or special about a person or a church that conforms to the world's standards. There is nothing great about a selfish, prideful, or apathetic life. However, there is something inspirational and energetic about "someone" who lays down their life for the sake of another. The greatest of the someone's is Jesus Christ and His very life is the "greater love".

Saint Mark's, Jesus Christ has the calling of "greatness" on our lives. He wants nothing less than great. Great by His standards, not ours. The month of March is going to prepare us for the "greatest" day in history that we will celebrate on April 20: Resurrection Sunday, or Easter Sunday.

In March, we enter into the season of Lent which will drive us to the Cross and Empty Tomb with a single minded passion. As we approach the celebration of the greatest day in history, we have the opportunity for the Holy Spirit to do the "greatest work" of love in us than we've ever known.

In John 15, Jesus is the Vine, His Father is the Vine Dresser, and we are the branches. I'm wondering during the season of Lent: in what ways we can break the mold of commonality and conformity and "branch out" demonstrating the "greater love" of Jesus? How can we be so connected to the Vine that we "branch out" in our relationship to Christ, asking, "Lord, how can I lay my life, my time, my money, my energies down for You, my best of friends? We could ask this concerning our families, "How can I lay my life down for those closet to me? How can I lay my schedule down to spend more time with them? How can I plan a great day with them and do something out of the ordinary?"

Maybe we could ask this in our Sunday school classes or mission ministry opportunities? As a local body, how can we "branch out" in faith, moving forward on our toes instead leaning back on our heals? One way that the 11th Hour community of Saint Mark's is beginning to "branch out" is by the formation of small groups. People are choosing to lay down their schedules and their lives to connect to Jesus Christ (the Vine) *together* each week in bible study, prayer, fellowship, and mission. We are calling them, "*Vine Groups.*" On March 2nd, the Saint Mark's Mission Team is hosting a Mission's fair in the CLC to demonstrate how our Lord's greater love is "branching out" from 400 Grants Ferry Road to the neighborhoods and nations. The Spirit of God is raising up many "someones" from Saint Mark's who are allowing Christ to offer His greater love through them. You may just be one of those "someones!"

One question for all of us during the season of Lent is this: Lord, how can I "branch out"? Pray with me: "Father, help me receive your greater love through Your Son, Jesus. I want to be so connected to Him as the Vine, that nothing common seeps out of my life. There is nothing common about You. There is no god like you. You are exalted above all of them because of Your greater love demonstrated in Christ. Let nothing but Heaven be produced in me and through me. Let nothing but Heaven branch out from Your church at Saint Mark's, for Your Name's sake: Jesus, Amen."

Rob's Remarks

I have been a spectator this season as I have watched Cason's basketball team play several games. In the past I have coached elementary boys basketball teams. I was on the Vicksburg High Basketball Team for three years. This season has taught me some good lessons.



First, I have lots a work to do on patience with other adults who coach kids. Cason's coach feels the necessity to spend ten or more minutes after a game reflecting on the play of his team with their input. I confess to you that I became very irritated by this post game ritual, especially when the team got clobbered by their opponent and it was 9:00PM and we had to drive twenty five minutes back to our house, get showers and listen to a litany of reasons why the team could have won the game but didn't. I thought this coach was not respectful of MY TIME as a parent and didn't he know that MY SON needed ten hours of sleep? The nerve of some people so please note some of this is meant with sarcasm.

So last night I sat quietly as coach held his team meeting after the game. My behavior changed after enduring several retorts from my 11 year old and his Mother who think my patience and arrogance need some work in the prayer room of my faith.

Secondly, what I discovered was that this coach was a teacher and he really did want to teach these young boys about being a team. However, little boys (and their parents) like to win. So each time the team lost I wondered how coach would deal with these boys. There are only two boys on this team of ten who can walk and chew gum at the same time and neither of them is related to me. And yet I found myself very frustrated and even incensed when these boys would refuse to make a pass to a wide-open teammate but would "hog the ball" and miss baskets. It made matters worse when the one who is related to me failed to fulfill his impersonation of Ole Miss basketball player, Marshall Henderson, who is his hero, by scoring multiple three-point baskets. Fortunately he did score a basket in the next game and has contributed to the scoring since.

Finally I saw that the coach's persistence has paid off. Last night these boys became a team. The two boys who usually scored the most baskets scored their share of points. But something else happened too. Everyone played together. They shared the ball and passed it to open teammates, who actually made some baskets except for the Marshall Henderson Want To Be. He played great defense and made a couple steals to get the ball for his team and he hustled.

And there I sat alone in the bleachers. I went up to the coach and thanked him. I wanted to say more but the time will come when I can thank him for teaching me. Yes this season has been good for me too. My humility and patience have been tested and found wanting. Perhaps this is preparation for the 40 days of Lent, the next season on my calendar.


