
Now it is coming to the Advent Season and we have the opportunity to do even more!

My ninth-grade daughter just went through a hitting slump during her softball season. This one was short, but it was frustrating to her; and it revived that little voice in her head that savs things like, "you don't know what you're doing" and "you'll never be as good as you want to be." And even, maybe deep in there somewhere: "You should just quit." Never mind the accomplishments she has made, the fun she is having, and the potential in front of her. In moments of defeat, it's hard to see the good stuff.

It was a short slump because, after she scowled a little while, she got back up. And when she got back up, my husband took her to the batting cage to help her tweak her swing. She reminded herself that she is a fast learner and knows how to play softball. At her dad's suggestion, she practiced adding a step to her slow-pitch swing to give her more power. Two days later, she went 5 for 8 in play-off games, and the coach said, "May's back!"

That won't be her last slump. She might even have another one before this article is printed. As long as she keeps playing softball, she will have to learn to deal with defeat and the tendency to criticize and doubt herself. But, if she keeps getting back up, she will learn lessons that will serve her well in every area of her whole life.

I have an amazing job. I get to accompany people through some serious slumps...courageous people who keep retooling and putting one foot in front of the other. Some learn quickly, grow deeply, and experience insight and change at a rapid rate. Others have steeper hills to climb, more obstacles to negotiate; and the slumps are longer. Sometimes, we have to peer very closely and purposefully to find good in their circumstances. We watch earnestly for buds of joy to water together. And, we celebrate any appearance of hope while we wait.

But, sometimes the waiting is long. The husband doesn't change. The mother doesn't understand. The job doesn't come. The grieving still aches. What then?

I have great admiration for people who just keep getting up, re-tooling, and looking for the next step. There's a difference between just settling on a joyless life (which seems a lot like quitting to me), and continuing to yearn and search for hope, even when you see none (which sounds like faith to me). The Bible tells us "faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). The Message version says it this way (read it twice; it's great): "The fundamental fact of existence is that this trust in God, this faith, is the firm foundation under everything that makes life worth living. It's our handle on what we can't see.'

Even with faith, we don't have assurance that our circumstances will work out like we desire. We do not stand on the solid rock of smooth circumstances, but on the solid rock of Christ... who truly loves us, and whose ways are higher than ours. He will be faithful to draw near to us when we draw near to Him, though sometimes His touch is not immediately felt. He delights in our every attempt, even feeble ones, to seek Him in the darkness.

When we are clouded by defeat and can't see the good stuff, He is our Father who helps us get back up and then lovingly accompanies us to "tweak our swing." His Word will help remind us of the truth so that we can get back in the batter's box with more power...His power.

Shining Christ's light into the community

A man named "Raji" was a member of an extremist Hindu group that targeted Christians. He despised a young Christian preacher named "Suta". Suta would visit Raji's village continually to share the gospel of Jesus. One day, Raji told Jeff Nesbit Suta, "We don't want to hear about your Jesus, and then he and others beat Suta and left him

for dead in a deep pit. Later, Raji could not shake what he had done. He was moved to go and rescue Suta from the pit. In this true story, the Holy Spirit used Suta's devotion to eventually lead Raji, a persecutor of Christians, to embrace Christ.*

I want to call us to embrace our persecuted brothers and sisters in Christ during the month of November. During Sundays in November, churches are praying for the persecuted on what is known as "International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church."

Suta says, "I am a simple man and without prayer, I am nothing. can not help but think that our God used prayers to save Suta and Raji. How do you pray for the persecuted? Open your bible to a passage in Psalms or Colossians or Hebrews or any book of the bible, and pray those verses for them. If Psalm 23, pray each verse in Psalm 23 for our persecuted faith family. Google "International Day of Prayer for the persecuted church" and you will find people that you can pray for and many other ways to be involved.

I really want to urge us to do this. Why? Not only for them, but for you and for me. You will need prayers for being persecuted soon if you are living each day to magnify the worth of Jesus. I will too. We'll need each other's prayers. "Indeed all who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted (2 Timothy 3:12)."

None of us seek persecution. We seek Jesus. That means we will be hated on account of Christ. However, we must remember this: we are loved by the Father of Christ. We are empowered by His Holy Spirit. That will keep us faithful and with that, our love for Jesus will bring all kinds of evil against us as a church. When it does, let's thank people for blessing us: "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on My account (Matthew 5:11)."

Let's thank God the Father for men and woman, boys and girls all around the world, even in our own nation, and in our own local church at Saint Mark's, who love Jesus so much that they consider it a "blessing" to be hated for His Name sake. Perhaps the Holy Spirit of God will use moments of our persecution to bring a persecutor, like Raji, to embrace Christ...




